PRESIDENT'S REFLECTIONS

Centerpoint has provided a major influence upon many Jungian professionals and laypersons, many of whom went on to study Jungian psychology. The value of the program was discussed at the most recent APC Board meeting. It became evident that several members of the current APC Board, including myself, studied Centerpoint years ago, which laid a foundation for further Jungian study.

The Centerpoint material was written by several prominent Jungians, including some who knew or worked with Carl G. Jung, such as Marie Louise von Franz and Edward Edinger, so it is not surprising that it has proven so influential. The lectures are presented in written format and are available also in audio format so that groups of individuals may listen together and then discuss the material. Mollie Morse, a former APC Board President, has continued to be the contact person for those wanting to pursue Centerpoint. Recently, I met with her to discuss re-initiating interest in this program. Mollie graciously agreed to discuss ways that we might offer the material to the club and the public once again.

When I could not find the Centerpoint website, I approached Chief Librarian of the KML and her assistant to research as to whether Centerpoint was still in existence. They located centerpointec.com. Centerpoint III was written by Chandler Brown and Elsom Eldridge, based on interviews and lectures of several Jungian analysts. It goes beyond the material in the original lectures, focusing on the American unconscious. Chandler Brown states that although these lectures were written a number of years ago, they are still relevant.

My recent columns point to the distressing state of the economy as exemplified by the bankruptcy of Detroit. The latest fiscal nightmare is the government shutdown, orchestrated by a minority of Washington Congressmen pressing for fiscal austerity. With these mind boggling, cliffhanger situations plaguing us, the possibility of understanding our American unconscious seems urgently needed. We as a country and as individuals need to do some real soul searching to help clarify what's going

on and to deepen our self-understanding. The Centerpoint III program may shed light on the subject. Mollie and I will explore the feasibility of presenting these lectures in the near future.


EDITORIAL NOTES


